

A Tribute to a and Old Home

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he story of Kurrajong begins in New South Wales where, as a teenager in the 1870s, JJ Miller helped his parents on their 3,000-acre sheep station (ranch) called Littledale.

A constant concern of the Millers, and the bane of every rancher and farmer in the Southern District, was the devastating droughts that could mercilessly destroy a season's stock or crop.

THE KURRAJONG TREE

Offering some relief from the relentless summer sun were the drought-resistant



Kurrajong trees. As a teenager, JJ planted Kurrajong trees around the family home to provide a small measure of comfort.

Through the 1880s and 1890s, JJ Miller became a successful and popular businessman. Upon entering politics he almost, but for 80 votes, became a Father of Confederation in 1898 when the five British colonies united to form the nation of Australia.

Dashed political aspirations and successive droughts helped JJ decide to emigrate to Canada in 1903 with his wife, Susannah, and daughters, Florence and Frida.

Arriving in the frontier town of Vancouver during its boom years, JJ quickly became a successful realtor/ auctioneer and, in 1908, built an impressive family mansion in the Queen Anne style.

Thinking of the measure of comfort provided by his native Australian tree, he named his new home Kurrajong.

KURRAJONG

Kurrajong cost \$30,000 to build in 1908 - more than many homes in the elite Shaughnessy area across town — and boasted six bedrooms, five fireplaces,

a kitchen (utilizing a hot water furnace with a copper boiler), dining room, drawing room, library, conservatory, lobby, and even a darkroom!

The header caps on both front entrance posts proudly bore brass "KURRAJONG" nameplates.

JJ AND THE PNE

Beyond his varied business interests, JJ Miller devoted much of his time to civic causes. He was the guiding force in the development of the Pacific National Exhibition

and became its first president, a position he held for 13 years. Miller Drive, on the PNE grounds, is named after JJ Miller.

THE ORIGINAL ADDRESS

Having one of the first homes in the new "Grand

View" area, the Millers were invited to choose their own address. JJ and Susannah chose "1015" after the ages of their daughters, Florence (10) and Frida (15). This address remained in use for several years before it was modified to 1036 Salsbury Drive.

LIFE AT KURRAJONG

Kurraiong was a loving. family home in every sense of the word. It not only housed JJ's immediate family, but his extended family during difficult times. Kurrajong was also a home away from home for visiting Australian sailors.

Before the days of radio and television, families made their own fun. After dinner, the dining room table was often cleared for a game of "table" tennis.

Parlour plays, poetry and cardplaying were popular pastimes at Kurrajong.

Kurrajong's grounds offered many attractions and amusements, including the flower gardens, orchard, large aviary and fish pond.
